

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I am filled with gratitude to you and to our United Church for the spiritual practice of Sabbatical, Vacation and Study Leave, which I enjoyed from May 1 to September 4, 2019. As I look back over the seven and a half years that I have served with you, there have been very significant changes in our family that I didn't take time to fully process. I simply adapted to the changes and moved forward. The time away gave me the opportunity to step back and make changes that I trust will help me serve God and you more faithfully.

I set aside time for family. In May, we welcomed Henry Andrew Smith, son of Helen and Robert and much-loved little brother of John and William to our family. Then I spent two wonderful weeks with my brother Rick at his new home in Gatineau. By ourselves for the first time in our lives, he worked, and I read, walked and cooked. When he was away for the long weekend, I went to a museum and church. Together we went to the Agriculture and Food Museum and the Dominion Arboretum which led to wonderful memories of our mom and dad and growing up on the farm. Back home, I enjoyed events leading up to and the wedding of our niece Kelly and her husband Dan at Casa Loma in Toronto followed by a dinner cruise on Lake Ontario. After the wedding, my nephew Max, niece Emma and I drove back to Gatineau to spend the last week of school with Rick so their mom, Heather could focus on end of the year at J.F. Ross. We had fun hiking, playing bocce ball, building Lego and forts, watching "Grizzy and the Lemmings" and cleaning Rick's basement. In July, John and I spent three amazing weeks with our Austrian "sister" Friedrun, "brother" Paul and their mom Elfie. We have known them for over 20 years since Friedrun first came as a Lions Club Exchange Student. We enjoyed Vienna, Bleiberg and Salzburg, good food, schnapps and ice cream, mountain climbing and swimming, sightseeing, museums and art galleries – Friedrun is the director of the Museum of Modern Art – and more. When we came home, we headed to Solitaire Lake near Huntsville to the cabin my brother Phil booked for us last summer. It was wonderful to be there with his wife and children and Robert's nephew Llywe from England. We made wonderful new memories as we held Phil close sharing stories of him, mom and dad with Max, Emma, John, William and Henry.

Throughout the summer I read or listened to 27 books, including theology and biography; history, fiction and historical fiction; and inspirational books. Richard Wagamese's **Embers**, Ralph Milton's **Julian's Cell** and Barbara Brown Taylor's **Gospel Medicine** inspired me. Rereading Gene Stratton-Porter's **Freckles --** my grandfather's favourite book – brought joy. Deborah Quaile's **Rockwood: a Mosaic of Memories** kept you close to my heart and Trevor Noah's **Born a Crime** made me laugh while thinking deeply about what it really means to affirm everyone.

I worshipped in congregations in Niagara Falls, Ottawa, Kitchener-Waterloo, Austria, Huntsville and Guelph; by myself with John; Heather, Max and Emma; Helen and her boys; and Lisa. I ended up at church picnics in Bridgeport and at Trinity in Guelph, at services led by colleagues one of which was an old friend who happened to be preaching at his wife's church and heard excellent preaching including that of Richard Bott, our moderator. The congregations were United, Anglican, Catholic and Hope House. Worship was in English and German; inside and outside; in pews and circles, and at tables. I felt uneasy when I didn't know what was expected of me; welcomed by people and familiar music, scriptures; and patterns of worship, and deeply loved when the choir at Holy Saviour Anglican sang the 23rd Psalm arrangement that was written in memory of my brother Phil by his music teacher Jeff Enns.

I had time for walking and exercising, and doctors and physio appointments that have left me feeling much healthier; finished projects – making cushions, mending a quilt and sewing book bags for Lisa and I; and enjoyed gardening with John, Sarah, Helen, Emma, John and William. We grew blueberries, onions, carrots, tomatoes, pumpkins and herbs. The gardeners and rabbits managed to weed out our peas and beans. I am still enjoying my roses covered in snow.

With Lisa preaching and John joining you for worship, I was able to hear how your summer was going. I grieved with you when those we loved were sick or died and laughed when I heard of the joyful moments you shared over the summer. John, Sarah, Lisa and I were delighted to share an Austrian brunch with you on my first Sunday back at Stone.

I am so grateful to Lisa for her leadership in worship; Rev. Mary Elliott's pastoral care; Patty Lancaster and Ellen Thomson for receiving pastoral concerns; and everyone who offered care through prayers, kind words, visits or notes; Sharyn Southworth's capable management of the office; our Sabbatical Committee Barb Eley, Brian Mack and Ellen Thomson, and all those who took on additional responsibilities while I was away.

Thank you for your love and respect, prayers and encouragement that made my Sabbatical a time of renewal. It was a gift and it is a gift to be back in our busy congregations.

- September 8 Combined service at Stone United to welcome Rev. Leffler back from sabbatical. Special music was provided by the ensemble.

- September 29 Orange Shirt Day and acknowledgment of the First Nations territory.
- October 6 World Communion Sunday-communion was served using a variety of breads and juices. We give

thanks for our communion team in their work of preparing, serving and cleaning up.

It may therefore be seen as the oldest continuously published magazine in North America and the second oldest in the English-speaking world. The Christian Guardian was regarded as a major voice in the life of a growing country: as today, it commented not only on matters of religion in Canada but education and political affairs. Ryerson went on to serve in government and is credited with founding the public-school system in Upper Canada.

Pastoral Care worked with Rockwood Pastoral Care to organize the photo directory. Thanks to Carl Baker for setting up the appointments with families from Rockwood and stone and to the hosts from both churches.

Rockwood Outreach

Throughout the year we continuously respond to the needs of East Wellington Community Services Food Bank by purchasing healthy items for their freezer as well as fresh fruit, and by donating grocery store gift cards.

At Christmas time we make a donation to the Rural Women's Support Program (RWSP) and also purchase gift cards for the women and their children to assist with Christmas expenses.

Our Lenten Quiz finally ended in a tie with a bit of cheating on our part! The donations totaled a very generous \$793 for EWCS food bank, Anishnabeg Outreach and the RWSP. We mostly allocate the monies at year end, although we offer on-going support to the food bank. Our Easter Food Drive on Easter Sunday for donations to the food bank resulted in an avalanche of toilet paper and deodorant for which they are very grateful, as are we.

Our food fight at the end of April was a huge success and we thank all participants, especially Lisa Leffler who brought us up to speed with her mastery of technology, not to mention, a huge quantity of donated items. We made a total of \$2074 and Stone United was the winner with \$1065. We were very proud of our \$1009.

Our food bank drive on Thanksgiving Sunday brought in a few new items and \$225 which we will convert into grocery gift cards shortly. Prior to that we had used some of the balance in the Outreach account to purchase hams and turkeys for Thanksgiving.

Our Silent Auction is on 17 November. We are hoping that people will enjoy the change in style. We are especially excited about our new foray into creating live outdoor arrangements and have enjoyed some festive foraging in forests and in folks' basements. We plan to create beautiful masterpieces. Just to remind you there will be no Grab and Go so there will be fewer items on offer. We are happy to accept Christmas themed items for our Deck the Halls stall. To date the "Company's Coming" stall has the most items with favourite food items for stocking up the freezer or to save on Christmas baking, or just for a special treat. There will also hopefully be restaurant and store gift cards. As of now "Comfort and Joy" could use a few more items. The beneficiaries of our fund-raising will again be Anishnabeg Outreach, the food bank and RWSP. Hearing Stephen Jackson's wonderful message at Stone's anniversary was very inspirational for us and reinforced that Anishnabeg Outreach is a perfect partner for us.

Our Mission and Service donations to October 31st were \$9385 so we may have a shortfall of about \$1000. However, we may catch up somewhat by year end.

The Advent food drives will involve both churches and will follow the same format as last year.

Stone Canadian Foodgrains Bank Bushels for Change Project

Stone United embarked on a new outreach project with the Canadian Foodgrains Bank. Our project, called "Bushels for Change" had the objective of raising money to combat global hunger. A pumpkin growing contest was initiated in the Spring. Tammy and Amanda Smits and the youth of the congregation held a yard sale raising \$1,400. A challenge was issued to the congregation and broader community to fill a bushel basket with loose change. The project culminated in the Pumpkin Funfest Community Celebration hosted by the May family, on October 20th. The event included lunch, pumpkin weigh-off, pumpkin judging and various creative games. Enthusiastic participation by Barrie Hill and Rockwood congregations in addition to Stone members saw over 80 people in attendance.

The "bushel of loose change challenge" raising over \$2,000, added to the generous donations of more than \$2,600, and the yard sale proceeds, we have raised over \$6,000 to date. When matched 3:1 by the Canadian Government, our project has a total impact of over \$24,000 to provide relief for families dealing with global hunger and to help farmers adopt better conservation farming practices. Congratulations and a huge thank you to all who supported our first-year project!

Rockwood Property & Finance

Thanks to the committee members for their stellar work over the past year on behalf of the House of Joy and Rockwood United.

House of Joy: Since our last report most of the furnace grant money has been received so the new furnace is now paid for. Numerous small jobs around the building have been completed along with a full day of repairs done be Rogers' employees as a part of their volunteer day. The garage has been sided and looks quite good. Many little jobs were also accomplished for EWCS.

Church: The request for grant money as already mentioned has been paid out to us with a small portion still to come when we submit records to show how the new furnace has made us 'greener'. The basement has been substantially restored with a lot of work to stabilize it. The wheelchair walkway has been repaired to eliminate the large crack in the surface of the pad. The men's washroom has been repaired and painted now that the roof vent seal was replaced by the company that originally installed the roof. Eves and drainage around the building have also been addressed over the past summer.

With all the construction around us a detailed study of our stained-glass windows was undertaken by our group and by the Goetz team with everything photographed and video taped as insurance against damage.

This fall a new thermostat was installed in Heather's office to control the fireplace temperature. The dehumidifier was hooked up to run constantly without a person draining the tank so humidity issues should be relieved in Day Hall. A beautiful, new shelf was built and installed by Kevin Anthony in Day Hall entrance for coats and hats etc. Smoke alarm and carbon monoxide alarms have had their batteries changed in Heather's office.

Stone Property & Finance

Windows were installed in May 2019. The final cost for the windows was \$19,619.56 which was about \$300 less than the quoted price. An energy reduction grant from the United Church of Canada in the amount of \$11,583.87 reduced the net cost of windows to \$8,035.69. A final grant payment of \$1,000.00 will be paid after submission of the 2019 energy reports in 2020.

The old windows were carefully removed and have been made available for purchase by members of the congregation past and present as well as other interested parties. To date we have sold \$2,800 worth of windows and have commitments for about \$500 more. Some of these funds (\$650) went to the Foodgrains yard sale and the rest to general funds.

Water samples in July and October were okay and we continue to take samples every three months.

Two major fundraising activities occurred in October. First, the wrap-up of our Canadian Foodgrains Bank project with the Pumpkin Funfest hosted by the May family. This event raised over \$2,000 towards our project total. The second event was our annual Beef Dinner which raised \$4,900 supporting the operation of our Church.

Currently, the Church operating budget is running a \$6,000 deficit. However, with reduced transfers to the Pastoral Charge in November and December and the continued generous support of members, we anticipate covering our expenses by year-end.

The Church continues to be in a very healthy financial position with \$40,000 invested in GIC's and \$53,000 in the Oakes Fund.

We are called on to share our tangible gifts, and also the intangible ones – joy, laughter, compassion.

Rockwood Stone Finance & Stewardship

Our committee met on October 22 at Stone. As has become our practice, we started by writing thank you notes to members of our churches.

We decided to send a \$500 honorarium to Mary Elliott for providing pastoral care when Heather was on Sabbatical.

Treasurers were reminded that anyone who earns more than \$500 in the year must be issued a T4 slip. They were also asked to provide all banking information to be filed in the church office.

Stone Property and Finance were thanked for leading worship in the summer. Bill Allen's message was very much appreciated.

Our Treasurers Amanda Anthony at Rockwood, Bill Allen at Stone and Roy Steinberg for the Pastoral Charge shared the churches financial position. Roy negotiated a new contract with Cogeco which greatly reduced what we had been paying since our last contract ended.

We are in the process of reviewing the history of the manse fund. For this year, our committee requested a \$4,000 transfer from that fund to the pastoral charge account.

Erik Mathisen at the General Council Office advised us to keep the T3's from our investment with Canoe Financial on file. If Canada Revenue Agency questions us, Erik advised that we say "the pastoral charge is a non-profit entity that exists solely as an administrative construct of the charitable body and that any income accrues for the benefit of the underlying charitable bodies. There is clearly no intentional tax avoidance."

In 2020, each church will make equal payments to the pastoral charge throughout the year. With more people on PAR – Preauthorized Remittance there is no longer a need for reduced payments in the summer.

As part of Invite, Inspire, Thank, Heather is leading conversations on stewardship in worship. We continue to be very grateful for the generous support of our congregations, pastoral charge and outreach projects.

Rockwood Stone Ministry and Personnel

The Ministry and Personnel committee met on November 3, 2019. The Minister's Annual Review had been conducted and the opportunity to reflect on the year and the sabbatical experience offered. The time for rest, rejuvenation and reflection was welcomed by Heather and gave her an opportunity for a resetting of priorities and ways of working. Lisa Leffler had provided the majority of the pulpit supply during the sabbatical and she was also provided with a meeting after the completion of the time in this role to reflect on her learnings. Overall the staff and congregations found the experience very positive and an opportunity for growth. Mary Elliott from Three Willows had provided back up ministerial support and payment of an honoraria to reflect the time spent has been approved by the Pastoral Charge Finance and Stewardship Committee from the sabbatical budget that had been set aside.

The meeting recommended the annual salary cost of living increase suggested by the United Church of Canada for 2020 of 1.9% to the pastoral charge for approval. Roy Steinberg Pastoral Charge Treasurer also noted increases in education leave and mileage allowance. These proposals apply to the Minister and Church Secretary. Each church is responsible to consider their own staff and service contracts annually and are reminded to consider both the minimum increase as well as other factors when determining compensation.
