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#### Letter from Minister Heather Leffler

#### Dear Siblings in Christ,

As we reflect on 2024 in our Pastoral Charge and the world around us, and as we anticipate celebrating the 100th anniversary of The United Church of Canada in 2025, we are reminded of the signs of the Spirit at work. These signs affirm that we continue to have an essential role in building God's kingdom.

In April of 2024, we were the first pastoral charge to become affirming. Traditionally, Affirm United's practice has been for individual congregations to make this decision. However, they celebrated with us as Rockwood and Stone made this commitment together. The day began with a wonderful worship service that moved from Stone to Rockwood, featuring bells, chimes, choirs, communion, balloons and rainbows. A delicious rainbow buffet and warm fellowship concluded our celebration. The decorations remained in place through the end of Pride Month to remind us and others of the important step we took. Seeing the challenges our LGBTQ2SI+ siblings face in 2025, this decision holds even greater significance. Amidst uncertainty, it is crucial for them to know they have allies who stand with them.

Our mission to support people in our communities and beyond becomes increasingly important. We see tent cities and a growing number of individuals facing hunger, homelessness, and economic insecurity both locally and globally. Through your support of Mission and Service, the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, East Wellington Community Services (EWCS) Foodbank, Rural Women's Support Program, Anishnabeg Outreach, and local school lunch programs, we provide food, reduce insecurity, and work toward reconciliation and justice. Stone added Royal City Mission, the Ecumenical Campus Ministry, and the Rainbow Chorus as new partners this year. When Royal City Mission lost its funding from the City of Guelph, we invited Marion Reidel to speak. Her visit inspired action: we purchased her book, hosted a freewill offering, and raised significant support for the Mission. Together, with these and other initiatives, our two congregations shared nearly \$44,000 with our partners.

Our worship attendance—averaging 40 people between Rockwood, Stone, and Zoom—represents two committed and vibrant communities. Your participation in our conversations each week has helped deepen relationships with God and each other. Beyond Sunday mornings, your efforts through events like the Country Breakfasts, Wellness Series, Foodgrains Celebration, Christmas Market, Carol Sing and other activities extend our impact far and wide. Rockwood Outreach's unique relationship with the Foodbank shows the Spirit at work in our midst. When EWCS needs specific items, those particular items are often on sale when the committee goes shopping, making your donations go even further. The Spirit is active within and through our churches.

Our councils are also exploring ways to be good stewards of our properties, ensuring that our buildings are well-used, and that potential rental income can support our ongoing mission. This stewardship reflects our dedication to sustaining God's work in the world.

I am deeply grateful for the care you show one another. My prayer for the coming year is that we expand this care to those we have not seen as regularly since the pandemic. Let's share the story of what serving God through our churches means. By inviting others into this rich life of faith, we can help them see the gifts of community and purpose that come from being Christ's hands and feet in the world.

Thank you for your faithful commitment to our churches and our shared mission.

The Committee met in April and October on Zoom to receive updates from our Treasurers and Property and Finance Committees and to discuss stewardship of our congregations. Our Church Treasurers received positive responses to the notes they included with the charitable receipts.

We were grateful for Roy Steinberg's faithful service as Pastoral Charge Treasurer for many years and to Bill Allen for taking on this role following Roy's death.

In April, we reviewed the plans for the minister's Sabbatical. It was noted that in January Stone sent Stewardship letters to 27 regular givers and 73 members who hadn't given in the last year, as well as contacting three adults and nine young people by email. Ed Nagel was added as Treasurer and cosigner of the Manse Fund with Frontier Capital.

Bill Allen and Amanda Hunter-Anthony assisted Heather in completing the statistical information for the United Church in the late spring.

In October, Rosslyn Bentley and Brian Mack from Ministry and Personnel joined the meeting to make salary recommendations for the minister and secretary. Heather noted that after corresponding with One License we have changed the name on our account to Rockwood-Stone Pastoral Charge and they affirmed we can continue to purchase one license for the Pastoral Charge. It was decided not to purchase a video license at this time. Input was given for the Pastoral Charge Budget for 2025.

Funds were drawn from the Manse Fund in the spring and fall to assist in paying the minister's salary.

#### Minister's Report to Ministry and Personnel for 2024

**Worship and Faith Formation** – I am grateful to everyone who contributes to worship, Contemplation and Conversation, and our Congregational Packs. These opportunities allow us to deepen our spirituality and strengthen our relationships. Thank you for sharing your gifts of music, words, prayers, reflections, and so much more.

Our Bible Study of the Epistles and Parables of Jesus, the Genesis Book Club, Spiritual Saturdays, Stone's Wellness Series, and Faith, Food, Friendship, and Fun provide meaningful learning experiences for our congregation, new friends from Arthur United Church, and our wider community.

**Pastoral Care and Fellowship** – Tea and Talk met the first half of the year and will resume in January 2025. Monthly Coffee Connections at the Bearded Barista continues to be a great way to connect.

A special thank you to Gwen Brander at Stone and Ian Pasmore at Rockwood for sending out cards, as well as everyone who reaches out to members of our church families. Whether through phone calls, emails, visits, writing Contemplation and Conversation, creating Congregational Packages, or sending Christmas cards, your efforts ensure that our community remains connected and cared for.

**Outreach** – Supporting our Outreach Committee at Rockwood, the Foodgrains Committee, and the Council at Stone is a privilege. These groups not only raise funds for our partners but also organize events and learning opportunities that build community within our congregations.

**Churches** – Our Property and Finance Committees and volunteers and caretakers take such good care of our churches and properties. I am grateful to meet with them and offer support.

I have been very grateful to the Rockwood Trustees for their work to sell the parking lot. With the sale falling through, the deposit was very helpful. We connected with the United Church Property Resource Corporation to talk about possibilities for Rockwood's building. The Council has decided to go in another direction.

Administration – Weekly, our secretary Lisa Leffler prepares the announcements, supports tech at our churches, edits videos of worship, posts them online, sends out Contemplation and Conversation and checks messages remotely. She assists with copying newsletters, Congregational Packages and Annual Reports and attends to other office duties as they arise.

Thanks to Treasurers Amanda Hunter-Anthony at Rockwood and Bill Allen at Stone and the Pastoral Charge for their faithful work and for collecting the mail.

I complete our annual statistics with the help of our treasurers, maintain our historical records and prepare the Annual Reports and newsletters – and am grateful to Board members and other volunteers who help with writing and editing.

**Sabbatical, Continuing Education and Self Care** – I was grateful for the opportunity to take part in the Rethinking Preaching Conference, the Festival of Homiletics, the Lester Randall Preaching Fellowship and the Effective Transitional Leadership Training. My Sabbatical allowed me to spend valuable time with family as we settled into our new home in St. Jacobs, and to read and reflect.

Monthly meetings with my support group and spiritual director, as well as coffee with Guelph clergy, help keep me grounded and inspired in my ministry.

**Neighbours** – Thanks to Marg Baker for helping to plan the World Day of Prayer service at Stone. We had people from neighbouring United Churches and St. John's Anglican. It was decided that the rural and town churches will work together moving forward.

We hosted the Good Friday service at Stone with choir members and readers from Rockwood, Stone, Barrie Hill and Speedside. I led the service with Rev. Lena Meideros.

John and I enjoy meeting with the Guelph Bridging Group.

**Western Ontario Waterways Regional Council (WOWRC)** – As a member of the WOW Executive, I serve on the Recruitment Team, organized cluster gatherings and helped plan regional meetings. Thank you to Liz Guthrie at Stone for representing us online at the spring and fall meetings and attending gatherings for the regional representatives. I continue to chair the Guided Prayer Network.

In November, I began serving as Pastoral Charge Supervisor for Eramosa Pastoral Charge.

- Sunday, February 18 Communion beginning of Lent
- Sunday, February 11 Rockwood's Annual Meeting Rev. Leffler led worship at Rockwood and at Stone the Worship and Faith Formation Committee led worship. Bill Allen shared his slides of his visit to Malawi.
- Friday, March 1 World Day of Prayer The service planned by Marg Baker and Rev. Leffler was held at Stone with 29 in attendance.
- Sunday, March 24 Palm Sunday Communion was served. Stone had a pancake breakfast prior to the service.
- March 24 Good Friday Service The service at Stone was led by Rev. Leffler and Rev. Lena Medeiros from Eramosa Pastoral Charge.
- Sunday, March 31-Easter Sunday Service
- Sunday, April 28 Affirm Celebration began at Stone with the pealing of the bells. Following the message and Statement of Intention, Rosemary Kennedy of Dublin Street in Guelph presented Stone with their certificate from Affirm United. A picture was taken on the steps after singing the first two verses of *Let Us Build a House*. #### **Faith Formation**

- Contemplation & Conversation Rev. Leffler continues to offer Contemplation and Conversation each Sunday. Along with the commentaries, we are often provided with links to various United Church resources for our individual study. At different times of the year (especially in conjunction with the Worship Packs), thoughtful commentaries have also been offered by Lisa Leffler, Sarah Leffler, Tammy Smits, Barb Parker, Karen Richardson, Liz Guthrie, Brian Mack, Cate Dewey, and Rosslyn Bentley.
- **Congregational Worship Packs** Rev. Leffler co-ordinated the Lent/Easter Pack and the Advent/Christmas Pack. Brian Mack and Lisa Leffler co-ordinated the Creation Pack. Each of the packs focused on a particular theme and contained weekly reflections which were used, as well, for Sunday Contemplation and Conversation pieces. Each pack offered spiritual practices, questions for thought, and activities including coloring pages.
- **Bible Study** Bible Study normally meets weekly on Tuesday evenings. In the winter and spring the focus was on the Epistles. Bible Study resumed for the autumn on October 29<sup>th</sup> on Zoom with participants from Stone, Rockwood, and Arthur studying the parables of Jesus.
- **Spiritual Saturday** Led by Lisa Leffler on-line and in person, Spiritual Saturday is normally held on the second Saturday of the month with the exception of August and September.
- Faith, Food, Friendship, and Fun These gatherings normally occur on the third Friday of the month. Thanks to Heather, John, and Lisa Leffler for planning the worship, the crafts, and the supper. (See Faith, Food, Friendship, and Fun Report.)
- **Choir** Led by Barb Eley and Liz Guthrie, choir has met in each church on a weekly basis since September 12. Earlier in the year, choir practices were combined. (See choir reports for Stone and Rockwood.)
- **Eramosa Ensemble** Under the direction of Barb Eley, the Eramosa Ensemble continues to meet regularly. (See Eramosa Ensemble Report.)
- **Chimes Choir** Under the direction of Christine Wenger, the Chimes Choir continues to meet regularly and provides beautiful music on special occasions. (See Chimes Choir Report,)
- Men's Coffee Group Men gather on the last Thursday of each month from 10:30 am to 12 noon at The Bearded Barista café.
- **Tea & Talk** Met bi-weekly from January through June at Rockwood United. The women did not meet in the autumn.
- Genesis Book Club Book club meets monthly normally on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday at 7 pm on Zoom or in-person at Stone. (See Book Club Report.)

#### Stone Council

#### Submitted by Brian Mack, Chair

Stone Council met two times during 2024. At each of the meetings, Council received for information written reports from each of our committees and orally from Rev. Leffler concerning her ministry.

Consensus this year was reached regarding the following:

- To disband the monthly coffee hour in favour of having a social time with food on special occasions or as a fundraiser. It was suggested that each committee choose an event to serve a meal at during the year.
- To resume having coffee/tea/hot chocolate available during the service using a single serve Keurig machine donated by John Leffler.
- To challenge the congregation at the February 2024 annual meeting to raise \$1100 to go with the \$2500 previously authorized by the Council to be taken from the Memorial Fund to finance new or re-visited outreach initiatives. At the Annual Meeting, an electronic poll would be used to determine the number and type of charities to fund along with the % of monies to be allocated to each charity. Legacy programs such as support of breakfast programs would continue.
- To plan a third Wellness Series for 2025 with details provide at January 2025 Council meeting.
- To defer a decision regarding a Planet Bean Coffee fundraiser until further information is available.
- To support participation in a Cluster organized United Church Anniversary Service being held on June 8, 2025.
- To participate in Rockwood's Anniversary service on an alternative date due to the cluster sponsored service on June 8, 2025.
- To host a meal/trivia night as a fundraiser for Foodgrains project in early 2025 with Tom Parker, Tammy Smits, Lisa Leffler, and Brian Mack forming an organizational committee.
- To support a re-union co-ordinated by Tammy Smits (in person and on-line) of our young people in late December 2024 with funding for the food served to come from the Sunday School Fund.
- To authorize Property & Finance to investigate and report back to the January 2025 council meeting on the possibility of fundraising using "Fundscrip" gift cards to support the General Operating Fund.
- To continue current practices regarding the set up/taking down of chairs and tables/cleaning when functions occur.
- To consider additional ways of generating rental income with input gathered to be considered at the January 2025 Council meeting.

Motions discussed and carried this year involved the following:

- That the combined amount of \$3600 (\$2500 from the Memorial Fund and \$1100 from the community outreach fund) be divided equally amongst four charities Royal City Mission, Anishnabeg Outreach, Guelph Ecumenical Campus Ministry, and Guelph Rainbow Chorus.
- That the remainder of the UP Fund be returned to the Waterloo Presbytery Extension Council, and if the decision is made to continue with the Wellness Series in 2025, that the community portion of the Oakes Fund be accessed for funding.
- That the original designation of a portion of the Oakes fund reading "Investment funds for future tuition needs to educate any member of Stone United Church in their quest to go into

the Seminary" be altered to reflect current pathways to the Ministry. The new designation would read: "Investment funds for future needs to support any member of Stone United Church with their educational expenses in fulfilment of any aspect of their approved program leading to recognized Ministry in the United Church of Canada (via email vote).

• That Lisa Leffler be granted \$3100 from the Oakes fund in response to her request for assistance re: expenses connected to her autism assessment and related counselling which have been approved as an essential part of her program of studies. Receipts for such expenses would be provided by Lisa at the request of the Treasurer. (via email vote).

Thank you to all who serve on Council and our various committees and discernment circles. Council is grateful to all members of our congregation who offer support in various ways in order that mandates be fulfilled, on-going initiatives be enhanced, and new initiatives be undertaken. Special thanks to Rev. Leffler for her guidance and her enthusiasm for our shared endeavours in ministry.

#### Canadian Foodgrains Bank Growing Project Submitted by Barb Parker

Stone United Church in conjunction with the participants from the churches of Rockwood, and Barrie Hill carried out our sixth Canadian Foodgrains Bank (CFB) growing project in 2024. This year, zucchinis, pumpkins and sunflowers were included in the growing competitions, and vegetable seeds were distributed to support the Harvest Table.

Bill Allen presented a CFB update on Sunday, October 13<sup>th</sup>, to recognize October 16<sup>th</sup> World Food Day.

The project wrap-up was held October 20<sup>th</sup> at Stone Church. An enthusiastic crowd gathered following the Anniversary Service and lunch, for conclusion of the growing competitions and activities.

Winners in the growing competitions included the Benham family, and Mead family, for the heaviest pumpkins, Nixon family for the smallest pumpkin, Heather Leffler for the best decorated, and Helen Smith for best carved pumpkins. The Sharman family grew the tallest sunflower and also tied with Murray Oliver for the sunflower with the biggest head, and the Parker family had the sunflower with most heads. The Nixon family had the tallest corn stalk. Previously, in August, Murray Oliver successfully defended his title as Zucchini growing champion!

The second year of the Harvest Table was very successful, providing the opportunity to share our surplus produce and plants with the community, while raising awareness and funds for our project. Our December breakfast, hosted by RUC, was well attended, and also very successful. Total fundraising was \$1398.08. With generous donations of \$7,621, all told, we raised an amazing \$9,019.08, our second highest to date.

The Stone Project is one of many growing projects to raise money for the Canadian Foodgrains Bank in its mandate to combat global hunger. Currently, it is estimated over 780 million people globally are experiencing hunger. Food insecurity is impacted by people fleeing violent conflict, climate change, natural disasters, political upheaval, and economic disruptions. This past year (April 23-March 24), the Canadian Foodgrains Bank provided funding of over \$68 million to 974,683 people in 35 countries, for emergency food assistance and long-term sustainable agriculture development. Africa remains the highest area of need.

#### Property – Jack Ward

Water samples were done every 3 months and passed.

The annual Maple Syrup fundraiser was very successful. Thanks to everyone involved in organizing, taking orders, picking up and making deliveries. A total of **\$2,285** was raised, which was slightly below the amount raised in 2023.

Take-out dinners were planned by Committee members Marg Baker, Liz Guthrie, Edie Ward and Barb Parker. May 1<sup>st</sup> served roast ham, scalloped potatoes, bean salad, dinner roll and butter tart square for dessert. June 12<sup>th</sup> served meatloaf, mashed potatoes, coleslaw, buns and carrot cupcakes. September 25<sup>th</sup> served turkey, dressing, mashed potatoes, carrots and cinnamon apple coffee cake. October 23<sup>rd</sup> served roast beef, mashed potatoes, turnip, coleslaw, buns and apple bars for dessert. A total of **\$5,956** was raised, which was \$3,100 more than 2023.

The kitchen was inspected by Public Health July 25, 2024, and passed.

The Bakeless Bake Sale was held in December to help with community outreach activities (local school nutrition programs and East Wellington Community Services).

#### Finance – Bill Allen

The Stone United Church continues to be challenged financially, posting a deficit on operations of \$4,367. Fortunately, we were able to decrease the \$9,000 deficit from 2023 by over half. Unfortunately, we have lost a few donors who have passed away over the last couple of years. An increase of \$3,100 over last year from Take-Out Dinner sales helped offset the reduction in givings. Church operating costs remained the same as 2023, partially as a result of a reduction of \$2,450 in heating fuel costs. Electricity costs increased by \$1,500 from the higher costs of operating the newly installed heat pump.

On the positive front, church donors stepped up to strongly support both community and global outreach activities. This year, we raised **\$9,019** in support of the Canadian Foodgrains Bank efforts to end global hunger. This was only slightly below what was raised in 2023. The congregation met the challenge of raising \$1,100 to support local community organizations. This money was topped-up from the Memorial Fund to provide \$900 to four community organizations. In addition, nutrition programs in three local schools were supported. Once again, Stone Church delivered a very successful "Wellness Series" attracting both church and community members to hear presentations on important wellbeing topics. This initiative was supported by a \$2,500 grant from the UPFund.

The Stone United Church currently holds in reserve a total of **\$86,456** in GIC's and short-term investments.

#### Stone Spring Wellness Series 2024

Our second annual Stone Wellness Series was held from February 10<sup>th</sup> through May 6<sup>th</sup> on various Saturdays at 10 am using a hybrid format. Our six presentations were about one hour in length followed by a time of fellowship. In total, there were 189 attendees with a subsequent 132 views on You Tube. The sessions had an average attendance of 31. There have been an average of 26 views per five of the sessions to date. It should be noted that one speaker requested to not be recorded and one speaker wished their presentation to only be available online for two weeks.

We were fortunate to receive \$2500 in funding for this initiative from the Eden Mills UP Fund under the auspices of the Western Ontario Waterways Region. Under the terms of this grant, the congregation was responsible for 20% of the costs of the initiative. Our costs for speaker honorariums, Eventbrite advertising, ads in the Wellington Advertiser, and associated items such as printer ink and paper were funded 80% by the UP fund (\$1828.65) and the remaining 20% was funded by Stone Council. \$671.35 is still left in the UPFund grant and will be returned if request to use the funds for 2025 is denied. A report will be filed with the UPFund thanking them for their kind assistance.

Special thanks to our wonderful speakers, Tammy Smits for setting up the Eventbrite site, everyone who donated items for the gift baskets, Heather DeJonge for organizing the gift baskets, Lisa and John Leffler for assisting with tech, Karen Richardson and Susan Carrothers for organizing the time of hospitality following each session, all those who provided the refreshments, and to everyone who attended in person or online. Thanks to Heather Leffler and Brian Mack who formulated the advertisements for use in The Wellington Advertiser and for the articles submitted to that same paper following each session. Five of the articles submitted were published. As well, we are grateful to the Board responsible for administering the UPFund and for the financial support and outreach vision of Stone Council.

We look forward to another series beginning in February of 2025. We are grateful to Council for again offering to help fund this initiative using some monies from the Community portion of the Oakes Fund.

#### Western Ontario Waterways

Worship is always a thoughtful and meaningful part of these meetings.

Life cycle changes in various churches, collaborative agreements and memorials were observed. We remembered the Honourable Murray Sinclair.

Financial reports were viewed, questioned and passed.

Some of the monies from each church disbandment come to Western Ontario Waterways. These monies will provide opportunities for continuation of ministry through the Congregational Legacy Fund, Bridge Loan Fund and Clergy Salary Fund. It will take some time to set these grants up.

Brenna Baker shared about the work happening in Community of Faith Stewardship Support. Andrew Hyde shared news from the Discipleship and Justice Commission.

Two of the items that will be heard at GC45 in Calgary in 2025:

- 1. The proposal from Glen Morris that would allow adherents to be elected to Governing Bodies of Communities of Faith in the United Church of Canada.
- 2. The establishment of an Autonomous National Indigenous organization.

The proposal for proxy voting for members unable to attend a meeting was defeated.

The proposal for a Student and Candidate Support Network was passed.

Both Andrew Hyde and Carolyn McMillan have been ordained. We wish each of them success in their ministries.

Jeff Neff, Congregational Support continues to host monthly Zoom meetings for Western Ontario Waterways lay representatives.

Rev. Rebekah Duncan will become the next WOW president at the end of the May 2-3, 2025 Western Ontario Waterways Regional meeting.

## Outreach

Members: Our faithful and enthusiastic committee members continue to be Marion Bascom, Marcia Haworth, Darlene MacPhedran, Kay Mathies, and Phyllis Puchyr. As always, we will happily welcome new members.

It has been a bittersweet year for Outreach. Bitter, because of the escalating cost of living which has brought many new faces to our community partners: Women in Crisis, Anishnabeg Outreach, and EWCS Food Bank, coupled with a reduction in the number of people able to donate. For the first time EWCS even supported a small number of homeless clients. Sweet, because the congregations of Rockwood and Stone have stepped up to the plate yet again and have supported all Outreach initiatives, and responded to requests for donations very generously, enabling us to provide an even greater level of support than usual and helping us to generate \$13,359.35 which is more than ever before. We extend our humble thanks to you all for the part you play in supporting our community. Your generosity truly does make a difference in the lives of many.

## How your support helped during 2024:

**Mission and Service**: This year our donations to Mission and Service fell short of our \$12,000 target with a year-end total of \$11,177. This can be explained by the fact that we rely entirely on weekly and PAR donations, rather than on our fund-raising and the number of regular contributors has decreased for various reasons. We thank our 15 or 16 regular contributors on behalf of the many people within Canada and worldwide that benefit so greatly from M and S. We are kept abreast of the diverse and

creative ways that M and S reaches out within Canada and through 72 partners in 21 countries throughout the world through monthly videos.

**East Wellington Community Services Food Bank:** This year we spent over \$1000 filling the food bank freezer several times. We also held a pre-Thanksgiving food drive as by early fall the shelves and freezers were badly in need of replenishment. We always ensure that we provide the most needed items, and our congregations responded in spades. We also received extremely generous cash donations and gift cards, then went grocery shopping with our bargain angel on our shoulders. In consultation with the food bank coordinator, we determined that the after-Christmas period is the most difficult for their clients, so we are giving Walmart gift cards to everyone in January and pray that this will help in the short term. This year each single person will receive a \$50 card and we have increased our giving to the families, therefore each family of 5 will receive a \$300 gift card, a family of 4 will receive \$250 etc.

**Rural Women's Support Program:** There was no increase in the number of Rockwood women receiving counselling through our local Rural Women's Support Program, so each of 3 received a \$100 Wal-Mart gift card. However, the needs of parent organization Guelph-Wellington Women in Crisis have increased significantly therefore we will donate \$1500 to further their work in assisting women and children to find safe living accommodation and other supports.

**Anishnabeg Outreach:** In September we again invited our congregations to stand in solidarity with our Indigenous brothers and sisters by wearing an orange shirt to demonstrate our awareness of the impact of the Residential School System in Canada. Each Sunday during Advent we collected the most needed items for Spirit Bundles and will send a further \$1000 to support this ongoing and much needed initiative.

**Special Requests:** We continue to ensure we can respond to the folk that reach out for assistance by having a supply of grocery and gas cards available in the office on which we spent \$375 in 2024. In addition, we responded to some individuals experiencing financial hardship. One couple was unable to pay their Hydro bill and we provided the required \$284. We also helped a mother with Christmas expenses for her teenagers with \$300 in Walmart gift cards.

## How we raised Funds

We made over \$1200 with our **Robbie Burns Night** celebration dinner and entertainment. Key to the success was the enthusiastic attendees: fabulous Eramosa Ensemble, other talented singers, our splendid bagpiper, majestic haggis addresser and slayer, witty toast deliverers, and efficient young servers all of whom added much authenticity to the event, not to mention the traditional Scottish meal.

We resurrected the Food Fix for Pi Day holding an email pie auction which made \$400.

Continuing the bitter-sweet train of thought: in March we catered the **Celebration of Life** for Roy Steinberg and are very grateful to the Steinberg family for their generous donation to Outreach. As a way of honouring Roy's memory, we donated a large amount of left-over food and \$1000 to Royal City Mission which was an organization close to Roy's heart.

## **Pop-Up Food Fight**

In November the Leffler family organized an impromptu Food Fight and we on Outreach were the grateful recipients of \$1205.

Our **Third Annual Christmas Market** was the best yet as we were thrilled to welcome so many attendees from the community who also enjoyed a coffee or lunch break in our mini café. We often hear that "it takes a village" but in this instance "it took a congregation." You brought along friends and family, posted on Facebook, provided beautiful greens for our Christmas planters, made labels and crafts, and became bidders, buyers, butchers, bakers and candlestick makers, setter-uppers, and cleaner uppers. The spill over of our market to the evening Carol Service on the same day and Stone's fund-raising breakfast for the Foodgrains bank the following week meant we sold out of absolutely everything. This event generated over \$5000 and helped us hugely to support the people in our community who need a hand up.

For a detailed record of how much each fund raiser made and how funds were distributed please see the year-end Operating Fund included in the 2024 RUC Financial Report.

We are forever grateful, to our Outreach committee members who will tackle anything that furthers the cause with enthusiasm and good humour as we continue to try help our neighbours whether within Rockwood or elsewhere. A huge thank you all the members of both RUC and Stone congregations who attended our events and responded generously to our donation requests. Thank you to our wonderful high school volunteers Hunter, Gwen, Heidi and Zara and to Heather for attending our meetings and supporting our sometimes-crazy ideas, and for being so tech-savvy. Thanks also go out to Lisa for organizing the announcements and to Amanda who painstakingly keeps track of Outreach finances.

As ever, we are united in a common cause to walk humbly with God as we demonstrate love and support for each other.

The Rockwood Trustees met on February 28<sup>th</sup>, March 3<sup>rd</sup>, March 13<sup>th</sup>, April 18<sup>th</sup>, June 7<sup>th</sup>, June 13<sup>th</sup>, November 14<sup>th</sup> Christine Wenger continues to be the corresponding secretary of the committee and Rev. Heather Leffler takes the minutes. Darryl Nichol has continued to take the lead in the development coordination. All members are thanked for their dedication and diligence in stewarding the church's assets as we move forward in these changing times.

The main focus of the Trustees activities in 2024 continued to be related to property and the proposed car park development. An offer had been made in 2023 to purchase the lot with an end date that was renegotiated to May 15<sup>th</sup>, 2024 with an increase in sale price to \$615k and an additional \$30k deposit (for a total of \$60k) then extended to May 31<sup>st</sup> and further extended June 7<sup>th</sup> to allow the prospective purchaser the opportunity to complete. Unfortunately despite these efforts the sale fell through and the deposit was collected by our lawyer. The Rev. John Benham represented Rev. Leffler's during her sabbatical in the two June meetings.

Due to the anticipated sale when the Trustees met in March a review of four bids resulted in the decision to engage KW Cornerstone to build the new car park and demolish 107 Harris Street. Work had begun in May to prepare for the demolition resulting in some fees but due to the failure of the sale the commitment was rescinded.

In March, Guelph Eramosa Township approved a reduction in the required development deposit from \$36k to \$26k. This deposit would need to be paid to the Township as soon as the property is sold.

Summary of deposit disposition:

September \$40k received, October 7<sup>th</sup> balance of deposit received less legal fees of \$9,943.60 = \$12,76.21 remaining.

Other financial matters to note: Extension council is owed \$160k (mortgage 107 Harris Street) and RUC has been provided with a repayment holiday since the fall of 2020 (which had been interest only payments).

Insurance: Primary (AIG/Kindred Insurance Inc.), Excess (Intact, Northbridge, Wawanesa, Ecclesiastical). Renewal December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024 with Property/Boiler full replacement cost was approved.

Investments

• value of Canoe investment \$400.23 as of December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2024

At this point the Trustees have recommended the church community be reengaged in a review and visioning process to consider the future of the church to allow for confidence in best stewardship efforts to align with the longer-term goals of the Rockwood United Church.
